

THE LEEDS & LIVERPOOL CANAL ROSETTE

A Red & White Rosette was worn by the gentlemen of the day in 1816. This was to celebrate the joining of Yorkshire and Lancashire by the opening of the Leeds & Liverpool Canal in the October of that year.

INSTRUCTIONS for making Rosettes using the pattern (page 2)

The pattern will produce 2 Rosettes

1. Glue the front and backs onto thin card and then cut out the parts
2. Fold the Rosette Strip backwards and forwards along the edges of the stripes
3. With the folded strip closed fold and nip together one end.
4. Fold back the last flap on each side
5. Staple the two "last flaps" together at the opposite end to the nipped folds
6. Open the folded strip into a small circle and spread out the end with the staple, keeping the opposite end together in the middle to form the rosette shape.
7. Flatten the centre where the ends have been nipped together.
8. Glue the Front onto the coloured side in the centre and press down firmly on a firm surface.
9. Crease the Rosette Tails along the lines and glue to the back of the Rosette.
10. Attach a safety pin to the back disc with strong tape and glue the disc to the back of the Rosette



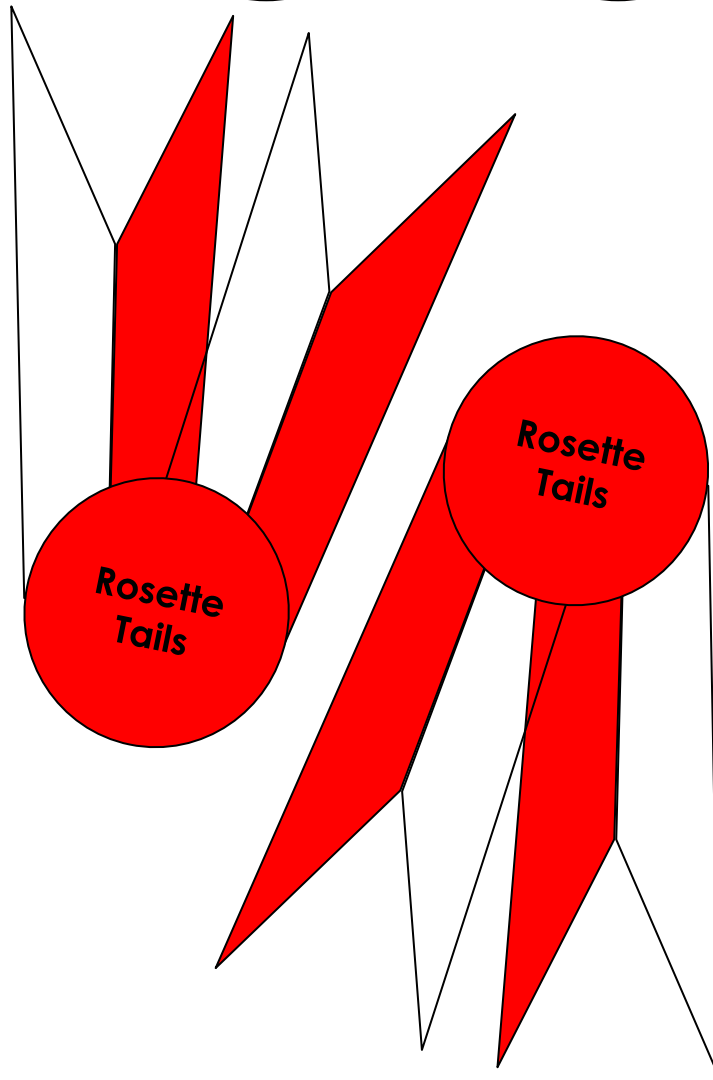
